


Survey Methodology

Sample	400 likely November 2024 voters
Dates	Conducted September 14 th to September 18 th , 2023
Methodology	 Phone: Landline and cell Online: text-to-web Survey conducted in English
Margin of error	 ±4.9% for entire sample; higher for subgroups Note: Due to rounding, responses may not add to 100% * next to subgroups indicate low sample size (<30)

Summary Findings

Atmosphere and Issues	>	Nearly three-quarters of voters (74%) feel things in Oakland are going in the wrong direction; including 72% of Democrats.
	>	74% of voters think the quality of life in Oakland has gotten worse in recent years.
	>	Voters feel that crime is the number one issue facing Oakland, with 83% volunteering crime as a major issue facing Oakland.
	>	74% of voters say reducing crime is absolutely critical.
Oakland Leadership	>	Mayor Thao is viewed unfavorably by voters (-25 net unfavorability), and over half of voters (56%) disapprove of the job Thao is doing as mayor.
	>	More than half (56%) of voters would currently vote to replace Mayor Thao.
	>	District Attorney Price is viewed unfavorably by voters (-20 net unfavorability), and half of voters (51%) disapprove of the job Price is doing as DA. A majority of voters (51%) would vote to replace DA Price.
Attitudes on Crime	>	91% are personally concerned about crime in Oakland.
	>	80% of voters think that crime is getting worse in Oakland.
	>	63% of voters do not feel safe from violent crime, and 80% of voters feel unsafe from property crime.
Impacts and Solutions	>	A majority of Oakland voters (55%) have considered leaving the city due to crime.
	>	Voters overwhelmingly support putting more resources into youth mentoring, putting more resources into the police force, enforcing criminal laws, and hiring more police.







Atmosphere & Issues



Almost three-in-four voters (74%) feel things in Oakland are going in the wrong direction; including 72% of Democrats


Do you feel things in Oakland are generally going in the right direction or are things on the wrong track?






74% of voters think that the overall quality of life in Oakland has become worse in the past few years; Latinos, Black voters are among most likely to say things have gotten worse


Would you say that the overall quality of life in Oakland has become better in the past few years, become worse, or stayed about the same?





When asked to volunteer the major issues facing Oakland, voters by a large margin say crime is the biggest issue





Where do I start? The completely inexperienced and inept mayor and City Council. Crime and homelessness is out of control. People are leaving because they can't take it anymore. Businesses are leaving because they are tired of getting broken into. I personally am afraid to even go out anymore. My beloved car was stolen. Many neighborhoods look like war zones.











Oakland Leadership



Elected officials: Mayor Thao (-25 net unfavorable) and District Attorney Price (-20) viewed unfavorably by voters






Over half of voters (56%) disapprove of the job Mayor Thao is doing; 73% of Black voters disapprove


Overall, do you approve or disapprove of the job Sheng Thao is doing as Mayor?






56% of voters would currently vote to replace Mayor Thao


If there was an election for Mayor today, would you vote to re-elect Mayor Sheng Thao or would you vote for someone else to replace Thao?






Two-thirds of voters (66%) disapprove of the Oakland City Council


Overall, do you approve or disapprove of the way the Oakland City Council is handling its job?






Half of voters (51%) disapprove of DA Price


Overall, do you approve or disapprove of the job Pamela Price is doing as District Attorney?






Majority of voters (51%) would vote to replace DA Price


If there was an election for Alameda County District Attorney today, would you vote to reelect DA Pamela Price or would you vote for someone else to replace Price?







Mayor Thao's endorsement would cause only 18% of voters more likely to vote for a prospective City Council candidate, compared to 36% saying it would make them less likely








Attitudes on Crime



Nine-in-ten voters (91%) are personally concerned about crime in Oakland, with 76% of voters very concerned










80% of voters think that crime in Oakland is getting worse









Twice as many voters (64% versus 32%) are concerned with violent crime than property crime






80% feel unsafe from property crime; half of voters feel very unsafe


How safe do you personally feel from property crime, like car break-ins and theft? Very safe, somewhat safe, somewhat unsafe, or very unsafe?







Almost two thirds of voters (63%) do not feel safe from violent crime

How safe do you personally feel from violent crime, like assault or gun violence? Very safe, somewhat safe, somewhat unsafe, or very unsafe?










To address crime and public safety, voters overwhelmingly support putting more resources into youth mentoring, putting more resources into the police force, enforcing criminal laws, and hiring more police




Almost three-in-four voters (74%) support increasing the number of officers in Oakland; with 55% strongly in support









Sixty-two percent of voters have personally experienced crime in the last few years









A majority of Oakland voters (55%) have considered moving out of Oakland due to crime; Latinos and Black voters under age 45 among most likely to have considered leaving






Nearly half of voters (48%) say that crime has caused them to shop in Oakland less often
